We were very pleased to host the annual Molecular Microbial Ecology Group Meeting (MMEG21) on the Norwich Research Park on 1-2<sup>nd</sup> December 2021. There was a fantastic response from the microbial ecology community in the UK who were clearly hoping for a long-awaited face-to-face meeting. The MMEG is a forum for early career researchers to present their research findings in a friendly and supportive environment and was long-awaited since postponement of the meeting from 2020. MMEG2021 was organised by Laura Lehtovirta-Morley (University of East Anglia), assisted by Matt Hutchings (John Innes Centre), Colin Murrell (UEA) and with excellent support from a number of people from their research teams and the fantastic staff at the John Innes Centre Conference Centre. Early career researchers presented 35 short talks and flash talks and there were also 21 excellent poster presentations. The Keynote Speaker for MMEG2021 was Dr Kirsten Bos, Research Group Leader for Molecular Palaeopathology at the Max Planck Institute for the Science of Human History, Jena Germany, who gave a fascinating talk entitled "New stories from old bones: genomic reconstructions of ancient pathogens". Thanks Kirsten for making the journey during the COVID pandemic! Much appreciated. Attendees also enjoyed a fantastic symposium dinner at Namaste Village and Revado's Kitchen, excellent vegetarian Indian restaurants in Norwich, which gave everyone a great opportunity to catch up and network after the best part of two years without a face-to-face conference.

We were very grateful for sponsorship from ISME, the Microbiology Society, Environmental Microbiome, FEMS, the Astrobiology Society of Britain and the Earth and Life Systems Alliance of the Norwich Research Park which enabled us to keep registration costs for the meeting, support attendance of our keynote speaker Kirsten Bos and provide prizes for the best talks and posters. ISME Ambassador James McDonald gave a five-minute presentation about the benefits of ISME membership, publishing in the ISME Journal and ISME Communications, and attending the upcoming ISME 18 conference in Lausanne in 2022. All of the presentations throughout MMEG2021 were of an extremely high standard and so it was difficult to single out the very best of these, making it a tough job for the panel judging them. Prize winners for the best talks were Nello Gregori (University of Warwick), Barbora Oudova (University of East Anglia) and Rebecca Ansorge (Quadrum Institute, Norwich). Flash presentation prize winners were Ainsley Beaton (John Innes Centre) and Marine Cambon (Bangor University).
